**STUDENT OBLIGATIONS**

Lecture attendance	A student must attend at least 1 lecture lesson to gain the minimal number of points - 3 points (coefficient = 3). In order to gain the maximal number of points – 6 points, the student must attend 2 lecture lessons (coefficient = 3).
Seminars attendance	A student must attend at least 4 seminar lessons to gain the minimal number of points - 4 points (coefficient = 1). In order to gain the maximal number of points – 6 points, the student must attend 6 seminar lessons (coefficient = 1).
Practicals attendance	A student must attend at least 8 exercise lessons to gain the minimal number of points - 4 points (coefficient = 0.5). In order to gain the maximal number of points – 6 points, the student must attend 12 seminar lessons (coefficient = 0.5).
Active participation in seminars and practicals	Participation at seminars: 5 – 10 points. Each student is obliged to make an essay which will be evaluated.
Final exam	A student must gain minimal 36 points from all 5 evaluation elements in order to take the final exam. The final exam is made of written part in form of a test (17 questions of which 15 question=2 points and 2 question = 1-5 points). Regardless to the gained number of points up to the final exam, a student must show the knowledge at this evaluation element as well and gain minimal 24 points. The maximum number of points a student can gain at the final exam is 40 points.

Examination requirements	Student requirements are defined in the Regulations on the Integrated Undergraduate and Graduate Study of Veterinary Medicine. Given the above, the student must acquire a minimum number of points from all assessment elements in order to take the final exam. <b>Article 45:</b> a student can justifiably be absent from up to 50 % of the lectures; 30% of the seminars and 30 % of the exercises.
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### GRADING AND EVALUATING STUDENT WORK

Continuous knowledge-checking (mid-terms)	Continuous knowledge checking: 20 – 32 points. Written preliminary exams will be organized upon completion of the filed exercises – 18/10/2019 Preliminary exam consists of 32 questions each referring to seminar materials. From this evaluation element a student can gain minimal 20 points (coefficient = 1) for 20 correct answers, or maximal 32 points for 32 correct answers (coefficient = 1).
